Day 1: South Lake Tahoe

After some roadside repairs, we headed up the mountains.

The place is a little off the beaten path, but as the night progressed, we discovered that it was a favorite of the service workers as they ended their shifts at the various casinos and hotels. And by the end, the place had filled with an enthusiastic crowd, demanding several encores before we finally played the last song.






Day 6: Grants Pass, Wendy King, and The Treasure Trove

Good friend, radio personality, and booking agent Wendy King has been a longtime supporter of Tom Savell and Superior Olive. In fact, she booked all of the dates for us on the Tom Savell Band tour. She also owns a costume shop/music venue in Grants Pass called the Treasure Trove (see www.myspace.com/treasuretrove), so of course she booked us there, too! We rocked "The Trove" on a torrid Friday night, much to the delight of Wendy and everyone else there.

Next day, Wendy took us to the Applegate Wagon Trail Museum & Interpretive Center, near Grants Pass. There we learned all about the history of Oregon and its early settlers. The Applegate trail was conceived as a safer, alternate route to the dangerous Oregon Trail. We also checked out the historic Grave Creek Covered bridge, where young Martha Crowley died in 1846.



Budd Inlet is the southern tip of Puget Sound, an arm of the Pacific Ocean which reaches inland, touching Seattle and spreading south through western Washington.

Although the name sounds like an exotic eastern restaurant, the Samurai Duck is actually a bar. Touted as "Eugene's Metal Venue", Samurai Duck was having a 4-band showcase that night, and we were to be the third band.

While listening to the first 2 bands, we began wondering if our brand of progressive Rock'n Roll would be too "soft" or "light" for this crowd. Indeed, the onslaught of hardcore, raging sonic fury from the opening bands seemed enough to make Godzilla cower away in fear. But there was nothing to worry about, as the audience, including members of said furious Metal bands, loved us to the point where they were screaming for encores. The staff of Samurai Duck was so appreciative, they offered us a drink of rare Japanese Habu Saké, with a whole snake inside the bottle! Scott and Joel were brave enough to try a shot, and agreed it was quite tasty.

While in the Grants Pass area, we checked out the Applegate Red winery. Run by Frank Ferreira, Applegate Red uses dry farming, which means no man-made irrigation is used. The grapevines rely solely on rain and the

Tom and Donkey natural water table. This method produces smaller grapes than irrigated vineyards, but the flavor is much more intense. The result is straightforward, big, full-bodied, robust red wine.

Frank also has a small (pun intended) herd of miniature donkeys. Frank let us into the corral to meet the donkeys. These little fellows stand about waist high and weigh about 250-300 pounds when fully grown. There was also a baby, carefully watched over by its mother (see pic to the left), and several more pregnant mothers-to-be.

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Day 14 Continued: Galice River

The Galice Resort is another great place to play. The band set up on the outdoor deck, with the Galice River and all the surrounding trees providing a majestic backdrop. There's nothing quite like playing music in a wilderness setting.

Towards the end of the night, the workers at the resort got out on the dance floor and took turns showing their stuff. They were a nice crew, and a lot of fun. And for the third gig in a row, our booking agent Wendy King blessed us with her presence.




