Simple Game to #6

Following in the heels of Tom's Savell's other hit "So Deep Within You" (written by Mike Pinder, co-founder of the legendary Moody Blues), the Savell/Pinder combination proves to be a winner once again, with another Pinder/Moody Blues classic: "Simple Game". The opening track on Savell's album "You Just Gotta Love It", Simple Game has steadily climbed to #6 on the Adult Contemporary radio airplay charts.

Mike Pinder

Mike Pinder is the founding keyboardist of the British rock group The Moody Blues. He was in a band with co-founder Ray Thomas, and together they went out to form a new band:

"I... went and got Ray Thomas out of the factory he was working at as a tool setter. We went around all the Birmingham groups and tried to steal the best people we could, and that's how we formed the Moody Blues in early '64."

He is also the composer of two of Tom Savell's top hits, So Deep Within You and Simple Game, which were both coincidentally recorded by The Four Tops. "I was unaware of The Four Tops versions of the songs until after the release of my album," says Tom. "But I was happy after I listened to them, to know that there were even more interpretations of the same songs." The Four Tops version of Simple Game was a huge hit in the UK.

When we were talking to Michael last week about our version of the song reaching #6, he said, "One award I am most proud of is the Ivor Novello award. I won the Novello for Social Comment for Simple Game." The highly respected and coveted Ivor Novello Awards, named after the Cardiff born entertainer Ivor Novello, are awards for songwriting and composing. The "Ivors" are presented yearly in London by the British Academy of Composers and Songwriters, and were first introduced in 1955. The Pinder Brothers

Mike Pinder's sons Matt and Michael Lee have become accomplished musicians and songwriters in their own right, making a name for themselves as "The Pinder Brothers" in Sacramento, CA. They're getting airplay on Sacramento radio station KWOD, and made KCRA's "A-List" as one of Sacramento's top bands. And they're getting great reviews too, like this:



Golden State Theatre

On May 25th, 2008, Tom Savell's Superior Olive Band took part in the "Stop the Spray in Monterey" benefit concert to raise awareness about the Light Brown Apple Moth pheremone spraying. The multi-act event was held under the lavish architecture of Monterey's historic Golden State Theatre.

One of the highlights of the show was when Dylan and Isaiah from Archer joined Tom on stage to perform his hit "So Deep Within You", followed by a searing rendition of Bob Dylan's "All Along the Watchtower".

After that, Tom presented Dylan with a personalized gallon jug of Tabasco Pepper Sauce. (Yes, you read that right, a big gallon jug of Tabasco!) On the label is written: "This vintage Tabasco pepper sauce has been especially bottled to become the private stock of: Dylan, You're Hot! Presented with due ceremony in the best tradition of the McIlhenny Company". The bottle is signed by Paul McIlhenny, President and CEO of the McIlhenny company.

They ended the set with the popular medley: Nights in White Satin/War Pigs with Tom on Violin and Dylan on Guitar.

Tom Savell Band, Still Fumin'Records, and Tabasco Pepper Sauce have teamed up to create some "hot" merchandise. These mini bottles spread the word about the Tom Savell Band while spicing up a meal!

Definition: Tabasco pepper

The **tabasco pepper** is a variety of chile pepper species Capsicum frutescens. It is best known through its use in Tabasco sauce, followed by peppered vinegar.

Like all frutescens chilis, the tabasco plant has a typical bushy growth, which commercial cultivation makes stronger by trimming the plants. The tapered fruits, around 4 cm long, are initially pale yellowish-green and turn yellow and orange before ripening to bright red. Tabascos rate from 30,000 to 50,000 on the Scoville scale of heat levels.

A large part of the tabasco pepper stock fell victim to the tobacco mosaic virus in the 1960s, and the first resistant variety (Greenleaf tabasco) was not able to be cultured until around 1970.

The Name "Tabasco"

Even though the word "tabasco" is the name of a Mexican state, this variety of pepper was first grown in large quantities in the U.S. state of Louisiana. The initial letter of "tabasco" is rendered in lowercase when referring to the botanical variety, but is capitalized ("Tabasco") when used as a brand name to refer to the pepper's namesake sauce product

The State of Tabasco, Mexico

Tabasco is a state in Mexico. It is bordered by the states of Veracruz to the west, Chiapas to the south, and Campeche to the north-east. To the east Tabasco borders with the Petén department of Guatemala, and to the north with the Gulf of Mexico. Tabasco is in the northern half of the Isthmus of Tehuantepec.

The state capital is Villahermosa.

In Tabasco and Veracruz, unlike the rest of Mexico, the accent is considered Caribbean Spanish, partly due to the heavy Cuban influence.

Regions

Some of its major rivers are the Grijalva and the Usumacinta, which run through the Tabasco Plain. The Tabasco plain is a coastal plain, with heavy rainfall, and covered in rainforest. It also contains beautiful rivers and waterfalls in the rainforest

Tourist attractions

Tourist attractions include, along with many others, the Olmec ruins of La Venta, and the Mayan ruins of Comalcalco. The town of Puerto Ceiba in the municipality of Paraíso is known for being the place where poet Carlos Pellicer Cámara got inspiration for much of his work.

The state capital Villahermosa is the primary home base for most tourists visiting the Mayan ruins in Palenque in the adjacent state of Chiapas.



A History of Tabasco Pepper Sauce

Tabasco Pepper Sauce: A condiment; a spicy hot sauce made from Tabasco peppers, vinegar, and salt. The hot peppers are picked by hand as soon as they ripen to the perfect shade of bright red. The same day the peppers are picked, they are mashed, mixed with a small amount of Avery Island salt, placed in white oak wooden barrels, and allowed to ferment and then age for up to three years. When deemed ready by a member of the McIlhenny family, the approved, fully aged mash is then blended with all natural, high grain vinegar. Numerous stirrings and about four weeks later, the pepper skins and seeds are strained out. The finished sauce is then bottled.

Avery Island (originally named Petite Anse Island) is not really an island – it is a huge dome of rock salt, three miles long and two and a half miles wide. At it's highest point it is only 152 feet above sea level. It is located seven miles south of New Iberia, surrounded by wet marsh and the Bayou Petite Anse. It's one of five along the Louisiana Gulf Coast, formed when an ancient seabed evaporated, depositing pure salt, which rose up in large chunks and pushed the ground into a hill.

Long before its namesake Avery family settled there in the 1830s, American Indians discovered that Avery Island's verdant flora covered a precious natural resource—a massive salt dome. There the Indians boiled the Island's briny spring water to extract salt, which they traded to other tribes as far away as central Texas, Arkansas, and Ohio.

19th Century

1850s - Edmund McIlhenny (1815-1890), a New Orleans banker, was given a gift by a soldier returning to New Orleans from Mexico of some dried peppers that were acquired in Mexico during the United States-Mexican War (1846-1848). The soldier told him to try them in his food. He used one or two and liked it, so he saved the seeds from the remaining peppers and planted them. He grew them in his wife's (Mary Eliza Avery) garden at Avery Island. McIlhenny did not raise them commercially for another twenty years.

1863 - In April of 1863, during the Civil War (1861-1865), Edmund McIlhenny fled with his wife when the Union Army entered the city. They took refuge on Avery Island in rural Iberia Parish, where her family owned a salt-mining business.

Because of the salt on the island, the Union forces invaded the island and captured the mines in 1863. The McIlhennys fled to Texas and didn't return until the end of the war. The area that would become Iberia Parish was hotly contested by Union and Confederate forces during the Civil War. Their battle lines moved back and forth through the area, and Union troops twice looted the town. They also seized the historic Weeks family mansion, now called "Shadows-on-the-Teche," (see www.shadowsontheteche.org) and used it as a command post — but not before it, too, was looted. As a Union officer noted, "the boys were allowed to go through it, sack, pillage and destroy every article within its walls."

When the McIlhenny family came back, they found their plantation ruined and their mansion plundered. One possession remained, a crop of capsicum hot peppers.

1868 – Determined to turn the peppers into income, he devised a spicy sauce using vinegar, Avery Island salt, and chopped capsicum peppers. McIlhenny packaged his aged sauce in 350 used cologne bottles and sent them as samples to likely wholesalers. He passed some of his sauce onto General Hazard, who was the federal administrator in the region. The general knew a good thing when he tasted it. His brother happened to be the largest wholesale grocer in the United States. General Hazard sent some of the hot sauce to his brother in New York, and told him it was made from a new kind of chili pepper. On the strength of the purchase orders that followed, Edmund McIlhenny began a commercial operation in 1868.

At first he wanted to call this new sauce Petite Anse Sauce (after the island), but when family members balked at the commercial use of the family's island name, he opted for his second choice "Tabasco." Some historians say it's a Central American Indian word that means "land where the soil is hot and humid." This certainly describes the climate of Avery Island. Other historians have put forth that it actually means "place of coral or oyster shell."



History of Tabasco Pepper Sauce 19th Century Continued

1870 - McIlhenny secured a patent Pepper Sauce. In 1872, he opened an office in London to handle the European market. Bottles with metal tops replaced the corked bottles sealed with green wax as the increasing demand for Tabasco sauce caused changes in the packaging.

1893 - Harvard University's Hasty Pudding Club produced a play called "Burlesque Opera of Tabasco" with the approval of Edmund McIlhenny's son, John Avery McIlhenny. He bought the rights to the production and had it staged in New York City.

1895 - Lord Horatio Herbert Kitcherner's (1850-1916), British Field Marshal and statesman, troops brought Tabasco pepper sauce on their invasion of Khartoum in the Sudan.

20th Century

1906 - In 1898, another Louisiana entrepreneur (and former McIlhenny employee) named B. F. Trappey began growing tabasco chiles from Avery Island seed. He founded the company B. F. Trappey and Sons and began producing his own sauce, which was also called "Tabasco." The McIlhenny family eventually responded to this challenge and a several decades-long feud by receiving a trademark for their Tabasco® brand in 1906.

1920s - In 1921, an American bartender in Paris, Fernand "Pete" Petiot, mixed up some vodka and tomato juice. According to legend, Petiot said, "It was suggested we call the drink 'Bloody Mary' because it reminded him of the Bucket of Blood Club in Chicago, and a girl there named Mary." In 1934, Petiot brought the drink to the King Cole Bar at the St. Regis Hotel in New York. It was in New York that he added pepper, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco, lemon, lime and horseradish. Petiot pushed his tomato-based drink as a hangover cure. Also called the Bucket of Blood (after the Chicago club), the drink was later renamed Red Snapper and Morning Glory before finally settling on the original name: Bloody Mary, supposedly after American entertainer George Jessel accidentally spilled one of the crimson beverages over a young woman named Mary.

1929 - In 1929, Trappey's expanded to two plants, one in Lafayette and one in New Iberia. That same year, the McIlhenny family won a trademark infringement suit against the Trappeys. From that time on, only the McIlhenny sauce could be called "Tabasco," and competitors were reduced to merely including tabasco chiles in their list of ingredients. The two companies had competed with identically named sauces for thirty-one years.

1932 - When the British government began an isolationist "Buy British" campaign, Parliament banned the purchases of Tabasco Pepper Sauce, popular in England since 1868 and available in the House of Commons dining rooms. The result protest from members of Parliament was dubbed "The Tabasco Tempest," and inevitably Tabasco pepper sauce returned to parliamentary tables. It is said, that to this day, Queen Elizabeth uses Tabasco pepper sauce on her lobster cocktail.


21st Century

2002 - Archaeologists digging at the site of a black-owned saloon in the historic Old West mining town of Virginia City unearthed a 130-year-old bottle of Tabasco brand hot sauce. The bottle, the oldest style of Tabasco bottle known to exist, was reconstructed from 21 shards of glass excavated from beneath the site of the Boston Saloon, which was owned by an African-American from Massachusetts and catered to blacks and whites from 1864-75, was among the first eateries to introduce the now-popular spicy sauce. "The Tabasco bottle is particularly intriguing because of what it implies about African-American cuisine and the development of the West," said Kelly Dixon, the administrator of the Comstock Archaeology Center who is supervising the dig in Virginia City about 20 miles southeast of Reno.

I've been blessed to have met many shining stars in my time including Aynsley Dunbar, Jorge Bermudez, Eric Burden, Jorge Santana, Arlo Guthrie, David & Linda LaFlamme (of It's Beautiful Day), Keith Greeninger, Mike Pinder, Patrick Moraz, Jewel, Prairie Prince, David Freiberg and Gary Duncan (of Quicksilver Messenger Service).

Unfortunately, sometimes the brightest stars have their flame extinguished at all too young We know about the well-publicized early demises of Robert Johnson, of an age. Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin, Brian Jones, Jim Morrison & Kurt Cobain (all at age 27), as well





as other high-profile deaths like Buddy Holly, Richie Valens, Big Bopper, Tupac Shakur, Big-E, and Sid Vicious. Even besides those, there have been too Janis J. many great musicians who were taken before their time. These tragedies have given me a greater appreciation for those who are still here on earth, and the gifts they continue to give in the form of music and entertainment.

Before Their Time Continued The New York Dolls

Certain bands seem to have terrible luck, dealing with death and hardship throughout their career. Lynyrd Skynyrd lost several key members in a 1977 plane crash, including lead singer Ronnie Van Zant. Motley Crue has dealt with death of friends, and a near-death experience within the band. Not as well known are the Proto-punk outfit, The New York Dolls.

David Johansen, better known as Buster Poindexter, is most famous for his Carribean flavored hit "Hot Hot!" in the late 1980's, although he was previously the singer and founding member of The New York Dolls". Although Johansen is alive and well, he has seen many of his former bandmates perish over the years.



The New York Dolls

The New York Dolls formed in 1971, and the first tragedy happened shortly thereafter when Drummer Billy Marcia died of a drug & alcohol overdose on Nov 6, 1972. He was 21. The rest of the band stayed together until 1977, then went their separate ways. Johansen re-emerged as Buster Poindexter, while guitarist Johnny Thunders and 2nd drummer Jerry Nolan formed Johnny Thunders and the Heartbreakers (not to be confused with Tom Petty's band)

After years of battling drug addiction, Johnny Thunders died in a New Orleans motel room on April 23, 1991 at age 38. Drummer #2 Jerry Nolan was the next to go, just a few months after performing at a tribute concert for his fallen bandmate Johnny. The 45 year old Nolan died of a stroke on January 14, 1992.

In 2004, alternative pop singer Morrissey convinced the surviving New York Dolls: Johansen, guitarist Sylvain Sylvain, and bassist Arthur "Killer" Kane to re-unite for the London Meltdown Festival. On July 14, 2004, just weeks after the show, Arthur Kane died following a lengthy battle with Leukemia. Johansen speculated that Kane "felt that there was unfinished business, and he was so focused on that that I think it kept his disease at bay."

Despite their apparent decimation, The New York Dolls, with surviving founders Sylvain Sylvain and David Johansen, released a well-received comeback album in 2006, called "One Day It Will Please Us To Remember Even This."

Syd Barrett



Syd Barrett lived to a reasonable age (at least compared to the young stars listed on the previous page), so he's not a Rock 'n Roll martyr in the obvious sense. But his creative frenzy, subsequent fame, and eventual breakdown happened so fast (in the span of a few years), that it almost seems like part of him could have died, back when he was still a young man, in the late 1960's.

As chief songwriter, singer, and guitarist for The Pink Floyd, Barrett first exploded onto the scene with the hit singles "Arnold Layne" and "See Emily Play". After a successful full length album, The Piper at the Gates of Dawn", Syd's

behavior became increasingly unstable. Emotional and professional pressures, combined with drug and alcohol abuse, left him mentally crippled and unable to finish live performances. His friend David Gilmore began to take his place as guitarist for the Floyd, but the band still hoped that Barrett would be able to continue his contributions as songwriter. Sadly, Barrett's condition continued to worsen, to the point where he became a virtual recluse, shut in at his London apartment (though he apparently still had no problems picking up girls.)

Eventually Syd returned home to Cambridge, England to live with his family and stayed there for the rest of his life. There he lived a humble existence painting, gardening, and riding his bike. (One of his many memorable lyrics were "I've got a bike you can ride it if you like!" From the song *Bike*.) He was rarely heard from until his death from pancreatic cancer in 2006, at the age of 60.



Quicksilver Messenger Service



In the late 1960's, the San Francisco Bay Area was a hotbed for new musical talent, as the psychedelic rock scene exploded into worldwide fame, with household-name bands like Jefferson Airplane, Big Brother & the Holding Company, It's a Beautiful Day and numerous others. Among the best of these groups was Quicksilver Messenger Service, most known for their hit "Fresh Air". ("Oooh, have another hit . . .") With their unique style of blues based rock, QMS has kept a loyal following throughout the decades since their initial rise to stardom, as well as attracting new generations of fans.

Tom and Gary Duncan

Friend and multi-talented musician Keith Graves has recently been performing with Quicksilver, adding his bass chops to the band's intricate sound.

Interesting fact: Current QMS drummer Prairie Prince was originally with the popular rock band, The Tubes. There's also an Aynsley Dunbar/Prairie Prince connection, as Prairie was actually the founding drummer of Journey, though his tenure only lasted a short time. Aynsley came on to replace him in 1974 when Prairie rejoined the Tubes for a tour.
