


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AES Conference San Francisco

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AES Continued: Steve Miller v5.1

One of the presentations at this years AES was the Grammy Sound Table, a Q&A discussion featuring rock icon Steve Miller, who had a long string of hits from the late '60s through early '80s. Among other things, Steve discussed the recording of his hit, "Fly Like an Eagle". To get the distinctive synthesizer sound in the song, he said he went to the local music shop and deliberately bought the cheapest, "dumbest" keyboard he could find. He also talked about and demonstrated the new remix of his songs in 5.1 Audio. That's five separate tracks and one sub-bass track, the same technology they use for surround-sound DVD movies. Well, the recording sounded so good, that Tom went out and bought a copy just days later. Of course, you need a 5.1 audio system in order to properly hear it.

Dr. Julius O. Smith, III presented the Heyser Lecture at the 121st AES Convention in San Francisco. His lecture was quite entertaining, containing recordings of computer-generated music and sound from the earliest days. One of the highlights was the original recording of a real computer that inspired the famous scene in the movie "2001: A Space Odyssey" where the HAL9000 computer sang "Daisy" as Dave the



astronaut removed parts of the computer's core.



Smith is currently a professor of music and associate professor (by courtesy) of electrical engineering at Stanford University's Center for Computer Research in Music and Acoustics, or CCRMA (commonly pronounced "Karma" by professionals and researchers in audio and music). He is also an excellent musician and guitarist who occasionally jams with Tom Savell, most often at the Paicines Ranch (see the article in this issue).

James Brown, "Patron Saint of Soul"

On December 25, 2006, legendary musician James Brown died from complications due to pneumonia. He was 73. Brown had checked into an Atlanta, Georgia hospital less than a day earlier accompanied by his manager. James Brown, called "The Hardest Working Man in Show Business" was still touring regularly when he became ill. He had several scheduled performances lined up through the new year, which he was determined to make. He never did.

"The Godfather of Soul" was born in Barnwell, South Carolina in 1933, during the depths of the great depression. He had his first musical success in the mid-1950's with the R&B group "The Flames". However, it wasn't until almost 10 years later that Brown forged his own muscial identity and his popularity skyrocketed. His hit songs "Papa's got a Brand New Bag", and "I Got You (I Feel Good)" are timeless classics that still sound fresh today.

In the late 1960's, he developed a new musical sound called "funk". It was based on Rhythm and Blues, but with a more complex and energetic rhythmic emphasis. His new sound would form the basis of popular later styles like Disco and Hip Hop. His trademark vocal style would directly influence Rap in the 1980's and beyond. Although Brown was himself a talented singer, guitarist, and pianist, he did not have any textbook knowledge of music theory. For that, he relied on the top-notch jazz and R&B musicians he hired. His former bandleader Fred Wesley recalls,

"It would have been impossible for James Brown to put his show together without the assistance of someone like Pee Wee [Ellis], who understood chord changes, time signatures, scales, notes, and basic music theory. Simple things like knowing the key would be a big problem for James ... The whole James Brown Show depended on having someone with musical knowledge remember the show, the individual parts, and the individual songs, then relay these verbally or in print to the other musicians. Brown could not do it himself. He spoke in grunts, groans, and la-di-das, and he needed musicians to translate that language into music and actual songs in order to create an actual show."

Brown continued to tour rigorously for the rest of his life. In the 1980's he enjoyed a resurgence in mainstream popularity with several movie and TV appearances, including a hit song "Living in America" from the movie "Rocky IV". He is survived by his wife Tomi Rae, 7 children, 8 grandchildren, and 4 great-grandchildren.
